

Mesila is dedicated to educating our youth to be financially responsible. Each program combines Torah perspectives and *hashkafah* with financial concepts and empowers students with the knowledge they need to be financially responsible.

By adding the Mesila program to your school's curriculum, you will be providing your students with a solid foundation for their financial future and giving them the tools they need to build a financially stable life.

All programs include a teacher's guide and PowerPoint presentation, and a curriculum that is geared to the specific age group:

## > Junior High

Topics include shopping responsibly, the value of money from a *hashkafic* perspective, how advertisers manipulate your mind, boundaries and integrity in *halachah*, social responsibility regarding peer pressure, and differentiating between needs and wants.

## **▶** High School

Topics include education and employment with thoughts from the *Chovos Halvavos*, women in the workplace (as *akeres habayis*), insurance, investments, savings, interest, building a budget, credit cards, shopping, and differentiating between needs and wants.

## **▶** Advanced High School

High school curriculum, with minor changes to qualify for college credits.

### Mesivta

High school curriculum, with additional mekoros and texts.

The Mesila curriculum is unlike any typical economics course. It has been designed to be relevant to the daily life of a Torah Jew. The curriculum incorporates economics with Torah *hashkafah* in a clear, easy-to-learn format. It addresses financial attitudes that may conflict with a Torah perspective and goes beyond theory to provide practical financial concepts that students can apply to their personal lives.




